# LITURGY of the WORD

#### **OLD TESTAMENT READING** — Leviticus 19:9-10 & 25:8-12

When you reap the harvest of your land, you shall not reap to the very edges of your field, or gather the gleanings of your harvest. You shall not strip your vineyard bare, or gather the fallen grapes of your vineyard; you shall leave them for the poor and the alien: I am the Lord your God.

You shall count off seven weeks of years, seven times seven years, so that the period of seven weeks of years gives forty-nine years. Then you shall have the trumpet sounded loud; on the tenth day of the seventh month—on the day of atonement—you shall have the trumpet sounded throughout all your land. And you shall hallow the fiftieth year and you shall proclaim liberty throughout the land to all its inhabitants. It shall be a jubilee for you: you shall return, every one of you, to your property and every one of you to your family. That fiftieth year shall be a jubilee for you: you shall not sow, or reap the aftergrowth, or harvest the unpruned vines. For it is a jubilee; it shall be holy to you: you shall eat only what the field itself produces.

#### A MONEY STORY: GOD'S AND OURS

# **COMING UP IN ADULT EDUCATION**

"What does it mean to be "Presbyterian"? Beginning October 31, also known as Reformation Sunday, the Rev. Jack McAnlis will lead a 4-week look at who we are as Presbyterians. How did we get here and what are the beliefs that keep us going? How important is the Bible and the doctrine of "predestination"? Religious movements of the 16th century gave rise to the Reformation, Protestantism and Presbyterianism. A major event in this process was in 1517 when Martin Luther circulated his Ninety-five Theses questioning basic tenets of the Roman Catholic church. John Calvin and other Reformers also sought to build a church that was true to the teachings of Jesus as found in the Bible. It is a rich theological tradition and important for study in bolstering our moral and spiritual lives as a community of faith in the 21st century. We hope you will join us either over Zoom or in-person from 9:30 to 10:20 a.m. each Sunday.
